14.30-16.00 **Plenary I: University Autonomy in Europe**

Today's universities are expected to fulfil both their (traditional) teaching and research missions, as well as take on a number of different societal roles. In order to do this successfully, they need to be able to take decisions on the issues affecting them, such as their management, finances, human resources and academic profile. In the first plenary session, the topic will be addressed through an illustrative keynote presentation and the release of EUA's updated Autonomy Scorecard, which benchmarks university autonomy throughout Europe. Five years after its original launch, the Scorecard will show how the relation between the sector and the state has evolved across Europe, highlighting trends and challenges.

16.30-18.00 **Breakout Session I – Working groups**

Participants will have the opportunity to discuss the different dimensions of university autonomy in four thematic breakout sessions. Each working group coordinated by a university leader will approach their topic practically. The aim of these interactive sessions is to generate a common understanding of the concrete impact and added value of each given autonomy dimension in day-to-day management, as well as in the broader institutional strategy setting. The participants will be invited to assess the related effects on the capacity of universities to respond to the societal challenges. Participants will be able to select one the four main "autonomy dimensions", according to their interest in internal organisation and decision-making processes; financial management and budget allocation; human resources recruitment and management; and internal academic affairs.
